Tisha B'Av (the fast day that is on the ninth of the Hebrew month of Av) is a period of fasting, lamentation and prayer to remember the destruction of the First and Second Temples of Jerusalem and other major disasters and tragedies that Jewish people experienced throughout history.

The evening begins at 9:45 pm with a Tisha B'Av Ma'ariv service and will be followed by a D'var Torah and reading of Eicha. Blessed are You Who Opens Our Eyes

How Mental Illness Can Blind Us

On Shabbat of Shlach L'cha, I spoke about the terrible report of the spies who scouted out the Land of Israel for Moses and the Israelites. That was the same week that the world was shocked by the fact that celebrity designer Kate Spade and celebrity food writer Anthony Bourdain had died from suicide.

These celebrity deaths shone a bright spotlight on a terrible truth that we may know rationally, but often fail to internalize: external measures of "success" (wealth, fame, power) are not vaccinations against mental illness. In the same way that cancer, strokes and heart disease affect the entire population – so, too, does mental illness.

What I spoke about on Shabbat Shlach L'cha is to think about mental illness as an "eye disease". Mental illness can often affect the way that we see the world and the way that we see ourselves. We are incapable of seeing ourselves the way that God sees us.

When the spies return from scouting the Land of Israel, they say "We cannot attack that people for it is stronger than we" The Hebrew word for "than we" is mimenu. Interestingly, this exact word means both "than we" and "than him".

The Talmud reads this verse as "We cannot attack that people for the people is stronger than Him (i.e. God)." The Talmud in Tractate Sotah 35 understands this as a total lack of faith in God's power in the world. In other words, the spies were incapable of seeing the potential of the Israelites, the potential of the Land of Israel, or the possibility of future redemption. They could not see the world as God saw it. Their eyes had spiritual cataracts.

In Martin Buber's famous treatise, *The Eclipse of God*, he reminds us how human evil – though much smaller than Divine Good – can eclipse the visibility of God. The small moon can totally block out the enormous light of the sun. Similarly, a microscopic cataract can render a person completely blind.

One morning blessing we say each day is: Baruch Atah... Pokeach Ivrim. Blessed are you who gives sight to the blind. This Hebrew term "pokeach" is used several times to describe God opening up people's eyes. God opens the eyes of Hagar to see the well that God had placed for Hagar and Ishmael. There are realities that God can see that we cannot. When we are suffering spiritually or with our mental health, isn't this similar? We are incapable of seeing realities that God can see. To help open our eyes, to help us remove our spiritual cataracts, to help us wait out the emotional eclipses of life – we have one another.

Being present in each others lives with help, support and love for mental illness is no different than providing a meal-train for someone going through chemotherapy or physical rehabilitation.

Life Lesson 10: Every Ending Sparks a New Beginning

We travel many roads on the highway of life; some good and some bad, some happy and some sad. Along our journey, we find so many reasons to smile as we navigate the roads to happiness. But, every road, even the happy ones, must come to an end. And one day we finally realize that at the end of that road is a new beginning.

Why must the road end? Why must we grieve? Why can't we just remember the good times? We may spend years with people we love, and God calls them to a better place. A long-term relationship with someone we loved very much may abruptly come to an end. Our children whom we have nurtured throughout their formative years may leave for college, get married or find a job in another city. Regardless of the reason, we all go through a grieving process. We are sad, even devastated with the loss of someone we cherished, or the emptiness we feel when standing in our child's room, realizing they will no longer be here on a daily basis because they are off to begin the next stage of their lives, maybe even to raise a family of their own.

Psychologists will probably explain that there are many levels of sadness and degrees of loss. While grieving, we may think about the wonderful times we shared together. It helps us cope with the loss. We think about the past, but dwell on the present. We may laugh when we think of the silly things we may have done together, and we may cry

when we think of the hugs we will be missing and the tears we may no longer share.

We may think about the time our child first went off to kindergarten, rode a bike or spent countless hours playing in the yard. We do understand children don't leave us because we did something wrong; it is difficult to accept the fact that they are all grown up.

In the beginning, there may be far more tears than smiles. But the more we think about the good times we had, the happier we begin to feel, and then those happy feelings overtake those tears. We finally realize that while we are sad because we have suffered some kind of loss, we have so much to be thankful for, so much to feel happy about.

Let's look for the happy moments in our lives to remember. Let's turn those tears into smiles. Whether we lose someone to God or to some college admissions counselor, we should always remember the good times we had together and the better times to come. As German poet and author Ludwig Jacobowski, a major Jewish figure in 19th century German literature wrote, "Don't cry because it's over; smile because it happened".

Annual Meeting Remarks - June 10, 2018

I would like to share a bit of history with you, and then some exciting news. As all of you recall, we moved to our Lamar location approximately 13 years ago. The plan then was to first build the school, and then build a sacred space. The plan was not to wait 13 years or more to build a sanctuary, but circumstances intervened and here we are.

We cannot look to the past, however; we must look to the future, and we are now ready to finish that project. After almost six years of hard work by an ever-changing group of people, I would like to tell you about our plans. You already know from the letter that all of you received last November that we hired an architect, named Scott Cohen, the principal in the firm of Preston Scott Cohen, Inc., who is based in Cambridge, MA and who teaches at the Harvard Graduate School of Design. His local partner will be BNIM, a well-respected firm based in Kansas City.

Scott and his team have come up with a preliminary design for a sacred space that is beautiful and flexible. It has seating for 150 people on a regular Shabbat, it can expand to seat between 300 and 450 people for larger services, and then expand again to seat over 600 people for the High Holidays. This new space, together with other modifications to our current building, will give us seating capacity for approximately 1100 people. We will renovate Goldsmith Hall, add a meat kitchen, and add a new parking area.

As most of you know, we received a significant gift from Mrs. Hannah Mae Krumholz for a chapel that will be part of this project. The chapel will be available for weekly use by the Library Minyan, and will be available for other uses throughout the year. It will open into the larger sacred space for the High Holidays and on other occasions if necessary.

With this new space and with the other modifications, we will not only be able to comfortably accommodate everyone for the High Holidays, but we will also have beautiful, inspiring spaces for weddings, Bar and Bat Mitzvah parties and other events.

The designs are preliminary, and they need to be reworked and costed out, but the initial concept is more beautiful and inspiring than anyone on the Sacred Space Steering Committee ever imagined.

Our plan going forward is to get a cost estimate, have a congregational meeting at the end of the summer or in early fall to reveal the design and seek input, and then to begin fundraising. From the time we begin construction it will take two to three years to complete the project.

Let me say a few words about fundraising. We stated in the letter in November, and we are reiterating, that there will be no assessment for current members. We also stated, and we reiterate, that we will not begin construction until we have secured sufficient pledges to cover the project's costs.

We hope that everyone will give generously, in accordance with their own financial capacity. When you see the design, I hope that you will be inspired to do so, not only for your own spiritual uplift when you pray in this gorgeous space, but for all the children, grandchildren and generations to come in our Beth Shalom community.

Thanks are due to the many Sacred Space Steering Committee members who have served over the past six years, some of whom continue to serve. They are: Mike Abrams, Jeff Alpert, Rita Cortés, Art Federman, Bernie Fried, Rabbi Glickman, Joel Goldman, Ron Goldsmith, Marcia Karbank, Alicia Klein, Bob Palan and Josh Sosland. Many of them have put in countless hours on this project and they have all been exceedingly generous with their time and their wisdom.

Shalom. Why so? In the next year, some of our members will send their children off to the Rose Family Early Childhood Education Center, and others to Polsky Religious School. They will celebrate B'nei Mitzvah, Brit Milot and baby namings. They will bring their memories to Shiva minyanim, and their home-cooked meals to those just home from the hospital. They will dance and perhaps eat and drink too much on Purim and Simchat Torah; and they'll commiserate with each other about how hungry they are on Yom Kippur and other fast days (including my own favorite, Tzom Gedalia- don't ask). And they'll do all those things, and more, because this institution has brought them- brought us- together, sometimes to enhance each other's joy, sometimes to alleviate each other's pain, but always to deepen the meaning of events and experiences in our lives.

This week's parshah is Korach. As you may know, Korach was part of a motley band of demagogues who rebelled against Moses' leadership. Perhaps not the best image for the event we're holding this morning. In announcing his rebellion, Korach challenges Moses, saying that "The whole community are holy, every one of them, and the Lord is within them." With the encouragement of several of you, I've been reading more of the writings of Rabbi Jonathan Sacks. Rabbi Sacks agrees with Korach, that each member of the community is holy, and that the Lord is within them. He says that that was the point of the making of the Tabernacle, where God says "have them make a sanctuary for Me, and I will dwell among them." (Ex. 25:8). But Korach goes on to say "Why then do you set yourselves above God's congregation?" Here, Rabbi Sacks says, Korach errs, because Moses didn't set himself above the congregation. According to Sacks, Korach fails to recognize that in Judaism everyone has equal dignity. He says that for practical reasons someone-such as those you elected to the Board today-needs to serve the function of leaders to hopefully insure that everyone is moving in the same direction. But each of us, each of you, has the right to participate in the affairs of this shul with equal dignity, and in so doing to make it a better place for all of us.

One of the more refreshing surprises since my nomination was announced is how few complaints I've received- there seems to be nary a Korach among us; instead, the calls I've received have overwhelmingly been offers of help, and we plan to take you all up on them. Many, in addition to those elected today, have also responded to requests from me and others to serve in a leadership role. Nancy Reichman has taken over assignment of shiva minyan leaders from her capable protege, Mara Lambert. Amy Shapiro and Cathy Alpert have agreed to chair a Pillars Committee;

Once again Ernie Rosenthal, this year assisted by Norman Kahn, will head up our High Holiday campaign. Susie Azorsky and Rachel Krantz have stepped up to head our Membership Committee, which we have renamed Outreach and Engagement. And Mike Berenbom has agreed to chair the Building and Grounds Committee, succeeding Chuck Gasser; Mike's task will be to help keep our existing building in good shape while we press ahead with our sacred space addition.

And, of course, Gina Kaiser and the members of her committee have carefully and thoughtfully brought us to the point where we will soon be able to imagine ourselves davening together in a truly inspiring space. I'm confident that you will be captivated by the design that our architect, Scott Cohen, is developing. Hopefully, at some point in your lives you have prayed in a space that made you feel that God truly was present with you; this will be such a place, and I look forward to sharing it with you and your families for many years to come.

In an institution our size, change is inevitable. The Board, and the staff, need to get out ahead of the changing nature of our membership, to find new opportunities for our younger members, for our empty nesters and retired members and for all ages in between. The new building may seem like a change from what we've gotten used to in recent years, but in fact it's really just completing the plan we set out so many years ago. But there will be other changes, and other exciting opportunities. I hope that we all will be open to new opportunities, to not letting our comfort with what we have gotten used to stand in the way of building on our rich past.

In last week's parshah, we read that "When you enter the land to which I am taking you and eat of the bread of the land, you shall set some aside as a gift to the Lord..." Our Eytz Chaim Chumash comments that the offering of dough is different from the offering of first fruits or the firstborn of the flocks, because it represents the human achievement of mixing several ingredients to make something new, different from any of its components. Even the products of human creativity are to be considered gifts from God." In closing, I would say that each of you has something new and different to contribute to our shul. I ask you to bring your ideas, your enthusiasm, and your energy to the life of the Congregation. Most of all, I ask you to bring yourselves, to our daily minyan, to the many programs we plan to offer this year and to any parts of the life of this Congregation that help bring you closer to God. I look forward to a meaningful year working with you.
